
The 24th, 25th, 26th, and 27th Service Battalions of the Northumberland Fusiliers: A Comprehensive History

Formation and Deployment

The 24th, 25th, and 26th Service Battalions were formed in August 1914, while the 27th Service Battalion was formed in September 1914. These


Disbandment






